I believe God has our parish in a great position,

poised to grow as disciples in holiness expressed in loving service to our neighbor. It requires us to intentionally choose to enter the fray. During my first year here at Our Lady of Grace I have witnessed:

Hospitality—As Christians, we welcome one and all. I'm grateful for the kindness and generous hearts with which this parish offers hospitality. We see it on Sundays when we have donuts, we experience it on Wednesdays when Mothers of Grace gather for a breakfast presentation, we share it every time we serve lunch at a funeral. Clearly I believe the Spirit graces us with the charism of hospitality.

Formation—Through discernment by our Parish Council, we have extended our Faith Formation staffing. Sean Lavell, Pastoral Associate for Mission and Discipleship, works to strengthen our parish offerings with the strong help of our Faith formation staff as well as our Faith Formation, Evangelization, and Stewardship committees. Christ calls us to discipleship. This lifelong process continually calls us to more deeply place our trust and confidence in God. Through God's grace, we are strengthening our charism of forming disciples.

Service—To love means to serve. Clearly this community loves. Love lived out in service expresses our bond to each other. Whether visiting elders in their homes, assisting with Sunday School, or wiping the counters in the restrooms, when done in love—and it is—it expresses Christ to others. When we serve meals at Sharing and Caring Hands, Christ's hands serve. When students from Cristo Rey High School work with us, we share Christ's hope. When we visit Honduras and Ghana, we witness Christ alive in other cultures. When we speak up for the underprivileged, Christ's voice is heard. When we visit the sick, care for grieving families, and teach our students, it is Christ who visits, comforts and teaches. The Holy Spirit manifests his myriad of service charisms through your hands, voices, and action.

Prayer—In my first homily here at OLG, I shared the essential place that prayer has in our lives. Catholics pray. As we take ten minutes to daily connect with Christ, we grow in awareness of His personal love for us. We pray in our adoration chapel, as families and small groups. The heart of our prayer lies in the Eucharist shared every Sunday. Gathered as a community of sisters and brothers, we ponder the Scriptures shared, feed on the Body and Blood of Christ broken and poured out for us, and go forth into the world loving and serving as Christ.

Finally, your financial generosity is making a difference. With the vision of the Parish Council, the wisdom of the Stewardship Committee, the expertise of the finance council overseeing our fiscal obligations, and your commitment, our income grew last

year. Your increased tithe enables us this year to maintain our FF and confirmation fees at last year's levels. It has allowed us to offer more in financial aid to OLG school families, as well as to help support JPII Prep. Talents shared – flow from our charisms – those gifts given to us by the Holy Spirit.

Intentional Discipleship 101

This summer and fall, over 300 parishioners have delved into the book Forming Intentional Disciples through small discussion groups. Many others have read the book on their own. Through their study, they have learned that there are essentially 5 thresholds one goes through from unbelief to becoming a disciple of Jesus Christ. The 5 thresholds are...


Trust: a person is able to trust and has a positive association with Jesus Christ, the Church, a Christian believer, or something identifiably Christian.

Curiosity: a person finds himself intrigued by or desiring to know more about Jesus, his life, and his teachings or some aspect of the Christian faith.

Openness: a person acknowledges to himself or herself and to God that he or she is open to the possibility of personal and spiritual change.

Seeking: the person moves from being essentially passive to actively seeking to know God who is calling him or her. At this threshold, the seeker is engaged in an urgent spiritual quest, seeking to know whether he or she can commit to Jesus in his Church.

Disciple: *intentional discipleship* is not accidental or merely cultural. It is not just a matter of 'following the rules'. All things serve and flow from the central thing: the worship and love of the Blessed Trinity with one's whole heart, soul, mind, and strength, and therefore the love of one's neighbor as one's self.



Forming Intentional Disciples also spells out three spiritual journeys. Typically, these spiritual journeys happen concurrently.

- 1) The personal interior journey of a lived relationship with Jesus resulting in intentional discipleship.
- 2) The ecclesial journey into the Church through reception of the sacraments of initiation.
- 3) The journey of active practice (as evidenced by receiving the sacraments, attending Mass, and participating in the life and mission of the Christian community).

We tend to assume that if #2 and #3 are happening, #1 is a given. Unfortunately, that is not necessarily so. All three spiritual journeys should happen concurrently, but that doesn't mean they actually do in practice.

Looking at journey #1, it's important to realize that before someone can have a personal relationship with Jesus, they have to understand that Jesus is a personal God. A recent survey discovered that 60% of Catholics don't believe in a personal God. 60%! One cannot have a personal relationship with a watchmaker God. Our God didn't wind up the world and let it go to be on its own. A personal God, by definition, is personally involved in our lives.

Deep down, we all have hungering for a personal relationship with Jesus. As such, that's what we at Our Lady of Grace are striving for: that all parishioners have a personal relationship with Jesus as his intentional disciples.

Stewardship is the grateful response of a Christian Disciple who recognizes and <mark>receives God's gifts and</mark> sh<mark>ares</mark> these <mark>g</mark>ifts in love of God and neighbor.

The four pillars of prayer, formation, hospitality, and service invite parishioners to experience, witness, and live the stewardship way of life in response to their baptismal call to intentional discipleship. Individually, each baptized person is called to give time to God in prayer, to serve others by sharing his/her talents, and to tithe to strengthen these four pillars that support the parish community. Conversely, by making our parish a place of prayer, formation, hospitality, and service, we provide greater opportunities for knowing and loving Jesus Christ, building that intimate relationship He desires from us.

Hospitality Pillar

Christine and Daryl Eastburg—Greeter Ministry

What would it take to move our hearts to know Jesus on a personal level? Daryl and I signed up to participate in one of the Intentional Disciple book clubs that took place during the summer months here at OLG. It was an eye-opener and a learning experience both to a cradle Catholic like me as well as to a convert to the faith like Daryl. Statistics show that less than 5-7% of Catholics are active in their parishes. We see many young Catholics leaving the church or not attending Mass. We've been there and done that as they say, but there was no peace. But now, due to a deeper understanding of what it is to be truly



Catholic, we love the Mass and the sacraments. It has enriched our lives with a new love for the church. It has in many ways sparked a new mode of activation to serve the church using the talents the Almighty God has given us. By starting to Ask, Seek, and Knock, one can actually fall in love with Jesus as a living Savior. One wants to serve after meditating on His sacrificial love on the cross. We knew we had to rethink our lives in what we were doing. It's worth giving back to Him in more ways than one, and it was a gift to be able to move together along this journey from a place of omission to a place of using our gifts.

Since 2003, we experience Jesus with the Ghana Mission Outreach and the committee members we work with. We have found Jesus serving on the Parish and Stewardship Councils. Spending an hour each week in Eucharistic Adoration has enhanced our call to serve. Occasionally, I have served on the food line at Sharing and Caring Hands. We gladly serve as Eucharistic Ministers on Sundays, and our latest calling is in forming the Greeters program. As we include Jesus more and more into our prayer life, He shows himself more and more. If we all would give a smidgen of our time to serve, we could move mountains.

In closing, we thank the Lord for showing us the importance of tithing with grateful hearts. It took a while for us to really get serious and comfortable with this one, but once we did, it has been a complete joy to see Him work in our lives. Our hearts were restless until they rested in Him, and His love surely radiates in our lives when we freely give. We do our best in giving of our income to further God's work because EVERYTHING we have comes as a GIFT from God.

Scripture reminds us, "Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received." (1 Peter 4:10) His grace has been poured out in full measure, and we are extremely grateful.



Formation Pillar

When I first chose to be a catechist, it was because I wanted to lead by example for my family. I have three boys, ages 7–12, and I wanted to demonstrate to them how important Faith Formation is to me, and therefore, how important it should be for them.

Service Pillar

Prayer Pillar

Why do I pray? I used to think my prayer was heard by a God far away, a God out in the Heavens, a God removed from my everyday life. God had bigger things to deal with than me. I didn't think my problems or thoughts mattered all that much to God. I prayed to God like he was a distant, wise grandfather, not a loving friend. For several years now I have been gradually developing a closer relationship with God. The little things I used to think were coincidences in my every day life, I now recognize as God's loving hand. He does care very much about the smallest details. And the bigger things as well.

Daily Mass? If you'd told me years ago that I'd one day desire to attend Mass not just once a week, but as often as possible, I wouldn't have believed it. Once a week was usually more than I could handle. After all, I had so much to do. Life was so busy. Now I attend daily Mass as often as possible. I look forward to Mass so I can worship and give thanks to God, who has been exceedingly patient with my wayward self. My journey's been a crooked one, but God has never stopped calling me in his whispering ways.

Stopping by a chapel to adore Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament? Who has time for that? What good would that really do anyway? I can pray anywhere anyway, right? So what's special about praying before Jesus in the form of a Host in a monstrance? In the past, I had too many other more important things to do. Now I just drop by the OLG chapel as often as possible, sometimes for only a minute or two, sometimes for an hour or more. It's well worth the time. Sometimes I read, sometimes I kneel or sit in the quiet. At times I get a deep sense that God is speaking, directly to me, deep in my soul. It's a communication that surprises me. It's hard to explain. When you sense it once, you want to experience it again and again.

Reading the Bible? That's for old people, scholars, and holy people, right? In my past, it wasn't for me. I didn't really give it much thought. What could an old book written ages ago have to do with my life now? Even if God did inspire the writers of the Bible, wasn't it a bit outdated? I heard the Bible readings at Mass anyway, wasn't that enough? I had better ways to spend my time. Now I belong to three different groups that get together regularly to pray, read the Bible and other Catholic spiritual books, and discuss our spiritual journeys. I specifically enjoy a form of prayerful reading of scripture called Lectio Divina. When I read a passage from the scriptures three of four times, I get a real sense that Jesus is speaking to me directly. When I take the time to slowly read Bible passages and imagine myself in the story, I hear His word, and it guides my life.

Now that I know the value of praying, I wish I could encourage everyone to take time for it every day. It only takes a moment.


Did You Know?

In fiscal year 2014/2015:

- Holy Eucharist shared with the homebound/LTC residents over 3,000 times
- Approximately 4,180 hours were spent in Eucharistic Adoration
- The OLG quilters made 91 quilts
- 11 parishioners traveled with Fr. Kevin to Ghana
- 5 parishioners traveled with Fr. Marc to Honduras
- The parish school had 10 teachers who are OLG graduates
- 1,623 meals were served at the Fish Fry
- 180 pints of blood were donated
- Stephen Ministers provide 2,000+ hours of service
- 330 people attended the Men's Club Gala
- The Men's Club sold 1,550 Christmas trees, which adorned our homes
- Math MCA scores for Our Lady of Grace school 3rd graders rank in the top 1.2%, 5th graders rank in the top 1.6%, and 7th graders rank in the top 0.5% in Minnesota.
- Coats, warm socks, hats, and gloves were collected in conjunction with the Tree Lot.
- We provided hospitality to numerous archdiocesan groups like Catholic Youth Camp, Birth Mothers, the Serra Club, the Widows Day of Reflection, etc.
- Homily podcasts were downloaded by people in the UK, Australia, Israel, Sweden, the Netherlands, Canada, Czech Republic, South Korea and the good old USA.

Did you know? Our wonderful Director of Pastoral Care, Beryl Schewe, published her first book, called *Habits of Resilience: Learning to Live Fully in the Midst of Loss*. The book offers valuable strategies for coping with grief.

The following chart illustrates the average weekly tithe by percentage of households whose giving is trackable through envelope collection, check, or automatic payment (EFT and credit card). Approximately 66% of registered parishioners made a trackable financial contribution in fiscal year 2014/2015. Thank you!



Financial Summary Report



We are pleased to present this annual report for Our Lady of Grace Parish, showing our financial and operating results for fiscal year ending June 30, 2015. We continue to be blessed with parishioners who demonstrate a consistent commitment to OLG through gifts of their time, talent, and tithing. Through Baptism we are called to build the Kingdom of God, here and now. As a parish community, we are called to use our skills, abilities, and talents for the good of our community and beyond. Through daily prayer and the Eucharist we discover who we are and what we have to offer as we open ourselves to the opportunities that come to each of us every day. We trust God's grace, one another, and our parish leadership in making necessary decisions on behalf



of our parish. We continue to respond to that trust by operating with a fiscally strong financial management plan, a plan designed to deliver the results you expect from the leadership of Our Lady of Grace.

The following financial statement shows that we ended our 2014-2015 fiscal year with a "Net Ordinary Income Surplus." The "Ordinary" income results are a reflection of how we manage our "day-to-day" operations.

At a summary level, the revenues collected from all ministries were slightly better than our projected budget. We experienced a 2.8% increase in "collection revenue" over the budget. Collection revenue funds most of our ministries and pays for the day-to-day operating expenses of the parish. We are very thankful for your continued financial support and we are hopeful that we can continue this positive trend. We were also able to control the parish's overhead costs, which allowed us to show total operating expenses for the year under what we had budgeted. This combination of operating revenues greater than budget and operating expenses less than budget enabled us to perform some maintenance projects over the summer. These projects allow the parish to improve the efficiency of the campus and improve handicap access, as well as increase campus security.

This statement also reports a surplus in "Net Income" after "Other" income and expenses. Included in the "Other" income and expenses are items like gains and losses on our parish investment accounts held at Catholic Community Foundation (CCF) and any special gifts we received over the course of the fiscal year as well.

Over the last two years we have spent considerable time and energy growing our endowments. The endowments are very important to the long term financial future of our parish and school. We were blessed to receive gifts to the endowments that went directly into the endowment funds at Catholic Community Foundation (CCF). The OLG School Endowment was blessed to be the largest benefactor of gifts last year. The long term objective of this endowment is to provide a financially sustainable school that offers excellent programs within a faith-filled environment. As far as market performance, it was a volatile year in the markets, and our funds experienced a modest decline in market valuation as a result of this volatility. This decline is included in our financial results.

In closing, we remain committed to operating the finances of our parish in a balanced way so as to maintain your trust. We ask you to recommit yourselves to this beautiful community as well. Please prayerfully consider making a new financial commitment or to increasing your financial commitment to allow us to continue to build a bright, Christ-filled future for Our Lady of Grace and for all those we serve. Our parish mission is TO MAKE JESUS CHRIST KNOWN AND LOVED! Please help us. We depend on your committed financial support.

The combined market value on June 30, 2015 was \$3,334,301. The parish endowments are "beneficiary," and permanently held and invested with the Catholic Community Foundation in the United States. Created in 1992 as a legal entity, the Foundation operates independently. Our endowment funds are professionally invested and protected from any liabilities of the parish, the Archdiocese and all other Catholic entities

Created exclusively to benefit the school's mission, programs, and operation, this fund ensures the school will remain viable for future generations




